
## ICCD 2025 Webinar: Mapping the Road Ahead

On February 15, ICCI hosted a national webinar titled "Developing a Roadmap for Childhood Cancer Service Delivery in India" to mark International Childhood Cancer Day.

# Pediatric Cancer Registry Data Meeting and CRC Workshop 2025

ICCI facilitated a landmark two-day workshop held in Chennai on January 31–February 1, 2025 to strengthen pediatric cancer data management and research coordination in India. It brought together expert clinicians, data managers, cancer registry staff, and clinical research coordinators (CRCs) from across the country to address key gaps in data quality, coordination, and usage for research and care.



#### **Key Highlights:**

The preliminary Population-Based Cancer Registry (PBCCR) report for Chennai was presented and released, alongside the inauguration of Tamil Nadu's PBCCR and the INPHOG HBCCR—marking a milestone in state-level cancer surveillance.

# Pediatric Cancer Registry Data Meeting and CRC Workshop 2025

- To ensure consistent and high quality data entry, Clinical Research Coordinators (CRCs) from across centers were trained on:
  - Study protocols (Neuroblastoma, B-NHL, APL, LCH, cHL)
  - Ethical consent, documentation, and follow-up standards
  - > Redcap database usage for efficient data capture & coding
- Experts presented updates on ongoing national studies and discussed barriers to high-quality data collection, with a focus on harmonizing standards across institutions.



The workshop reinforced best practices, encouraged institutional collaboration, and enhanced India's readiness for high-quality pediatric cancer research. This was a step forward in strengthening ICCI's mission of building a cohesive and future-ready cancer registry network to inform national policy, research, and care delivery.



As part of its IEC material development effort, ICCI undertook a rigorous review of content from 43 national and international sources, identifying 459 materials in various formats and languages. After expert screening and stakeholder scoring by a survivor, parent, and ICCI team member, 64 high-quality materials were approved.



In April 2025, ICCI hosted a two-day in-person workshop focused on strengthening early recognition and referral systems for childhood cancer in India—an essential step toward improving timely diagnosis and access to care for every child.

The event brought together over 90 participants, including government representatives, WHO officials, paediatric oncologists, frontline health professionals, NGOs, and civil society partners. The gathering provided a collaborative platform to develop, review, and refine the national framework for early cancer detection and referral pathways.

### **Brief on Proposed Document on Early Recognition**

We discussed the documentation we worked on for 2 months with the present stakeholders in various breakout groups. The participants were divided into breakout groups based on key symptom categories.

### The 8 Key Symptoms are:

- Anemia
- **Abdominal Distention**
- Lymphadenopathy
- **3** Genitalia abnormalities

- Bleeding
- **R** Eye Symptoms
- **4** Limb swelling
- Readache and other neurological signs and symptoms

### **Key Highlights:**

- Identification of children needing urgent referral.
- Ocumentation was to train the medical officers on red flags/early warning signs
- Listing symptoms and creating a practical algorithm.

#### **MAPPING - METHODS AND RESULTS**

Key findings from the national hospital mapping initiative highlights gaps and variations in paediatric cancer services across India. During this session a breakdown of private & public hospitals was done.

- > Mapping analysis on 108 cities.
- > Treating estimated number of 13722 per year.



### Stakeholder Engagement in Childhood Cancer Care in Odisha

ICCI, along with government bodies, hospitals, and civil society partners, convened a key stakeholder meeting to strengthen childhood cancer care in Odisha on April 26th, 2025.

### **Key Highlights:**



6 hospitals highlighted their institutional service capacities, and challenges in treating pedatric cancer

Various representation from 19 NGOs were made, highlighting the gap in childhood cancer treatment they have identified while working in specific areas concerning childhood cancer.

### ICCI Leadership Meeting 2025, Goa

ICCI convened its Governance Council, taskforce chairs, key members, WHO representatives, and external experts for a two-day strategic leadership meeting to review progress and chart the course for 2025–2026.



### **Key Highlights:**

- ▼ Taskforce Presentations: All taskforces shared updates on completed activities, ongoing initiatives, and future goals.
- Workshop on National Childhood Cancer Policy (NCCP): Led by external experts to initiate structured policy development.
- ▼ Financial Review: Council reviewed 2024–2025 utilization and approved the proposed 2025–2026 budget.
- Operational Planning: Discussed evolving the governance and operational framework for scale-up.
- Networking & Recognition: ICCI Awards were presented, and participants engaged in cross-stakeholder discussions to strengthen collaboration.
  - This meeting reaffirmed ICCI's commitment to inclusive leadership, transparent planning, and evidence-driven pediatric cancer policy advocacy.
